The Family Achievement Clinic specializes in assisting children and their families in resolving academic and other adjustment difficulties, including underachievement, gifted underachievement, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, behavior problems, etc. Operated by Silvia Rimm, Ph.D., this clinic presents a well developed "triadic" model of intervention into school problems simultaneously addressing the parent, child and school setting. I performed numerous assessments employing the WISC-III, PIAT-R, and the WJ-R. I was also directly responsible for treating underachieving and ADHD children and their parents.

Duties included direct service to diverse clinical populations, including adult clinical, adolescent, marital, addictions, and consultation to group homes and nursing facilities providing care to persons with mental retardation/developmental disabilities. I also performed numerous supervised diagnostic and intellectual assessments in a variety of venues, including personal injury, competency to assist in defense, workers compensation, Social Security disability, and vocational planning. I also provided training and crisis intervention in a variety of employment and government settings, including crisis intervention at the Cleveland Federal Building following the Oklahoma City bombing and a presentation at the Cleveland office of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.
